Sustainability. Here! Now!

1 000 experts from 100 nations worked for 10 years to summarise humanity's challenges. The results turned into an international standard (ISO 26000) that is open for all organisations to use, small or large.

We have developed "Sustainable. Here! Now!" since 2012, a method for collective problem solving inspired by the standard.

With the help of pictures and short texts, we now have a method for groups of various sizes and composition to address complex human challenges. The method has grown out of various collaborations with cultural actors and international organisations during the last four years.

Over the years, we have realised that it is also interesting to listen to people solving problems together.

At the Swedish Forum for Human Rights in Gothenburg 2015, we collaborated with Right

Livelihood Award Foundation's and Church of Sweden's exhibition to either take part in the problem solving or come and observe and listen while a group of people solve a problem together.

The problem solving exercise contained a challenge which is important to Nnimmo Bassey and many other Right Livelihood Award Laureates: If we wake up tomorrow without oil - what and how do we need to change?

Solving the problem took about 60 minutes, with nine selectively invited guests.

The Right Livelihood Award Laureate, Nnimmo Bassey from Nigeria, was as well part in the problem solving exercise.
